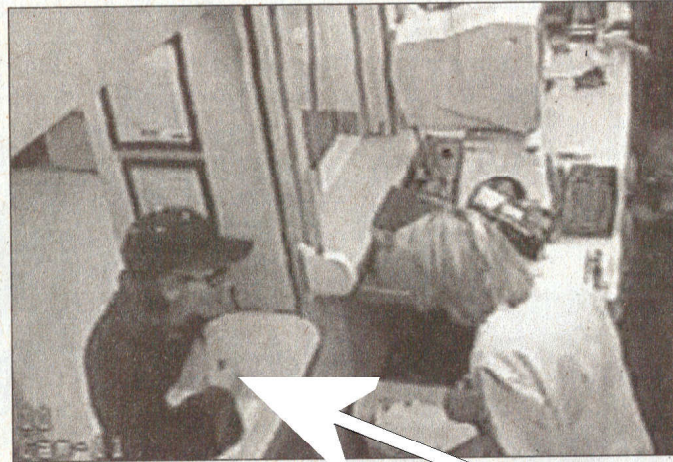


Man robs Panama City Wal-Mart pharmacy

Power outage

A reported 15-minute power outage occurred in downtown Panama City on Saturday morning.

The outage occurred at 8:17 p.m. and was reported to be fixed by 8 p.m. Gulf Power officials said Saturday night. The work was done by a large crew of Pan City

workers, working during the outage. Workers will conduct tests in Week 10, a schedule of weekly tests and possible state regulations, which prohibited spraying in that area.

A spokesman who said the spraying that is completed with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Environmental Services, or FDES, the state regulator agency that controls mosquito spray programs.

After a Week 10 newspaper complained to the state about defunct spraying near his beach last month, the state began an investigation into possible violations of state law by the county regarding mosquito spraying.
